Be it remembered that Carrah Gersonson (Name changed to Harry Gerson), then residing at number 505 Cato Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, who previous to his naturalization was a subject of Poland having applied to be admitted a citizen of the United States of America pursuant to law, and as a Special term of the District Court of the United States held at Pittsburgh on the 18th day of September in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and twenty-three the court having found that the petitioner had resided continuously within the United States for at least five years and in this State for at least one year immediately preceding the date of the filing of his petition, and that said petitioner intends to reside permanently in the United States, had in all respects complied with the law in relation thereto, and that he was entitled to be so admitted, it was thereupon ordered by the said court that he be admitted as a citizen of the United States of America.

In testimony whereof the seal of said court is hereunto affixed on the 18th day of September in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and twenty-three, and of our Independence the one hundred and forty-eighth.
