Dr. Alexander Lowy, aged 52, ofessor of organic chemistry at University of Pittsburgh and inent authority in the field of nce, passed away Thursday in West Penn Hospital. He had ill about four months.

Dr. Lowy was co-author of seval textbooks. Alone and in col-boration with students, he was he author of more than 70 reearch reports and scientific papers. In 1929 Dr. and Mrs. Lowy visted England and continental lurope, where he made a study of miversities and industry. He lec-nured extensively and frequently

addressed the American Chemical Society, in which he was a past chairman of the Pittsburgh section. Dr. Lowy also was a member of the American Electro-Chemical Society, and twice its vice president. He belonged to Sigma Xi and Phi Lambda Upsilon, honorary science societies, and was an honorary member of Sigma Alpha Mu fra-ternity. He was a member of important committees at the University of Pittsburgh and was faculty



Refugees in Philippines Safe Despite Jap Bombings

NEW YORK, Dec. 23 (JTA).— No casualties had been suffered by the 1,300 Jewish refugees in the Philippines as a result of repeated Japanese bombings of the islands, it was learned here this week by the Joint Distribution Committee.

A cable from the Refugee Commit-tee in Manila stated: "No casualties among transient, oldtime Jewish refugees." Most of the refugees have been in the Philippines for several years. Some came there di-rectly and others finally settled there after leaving Shanghai.

Hungarian Deputy

Hits Anti-Semitism STOCKHOLM, Dec. 24 (JTA).—The present Nazi-inspired wave of anti-Semitism in Europe is "the childish echo of ancient persecutions," declared a deputy of the Liberal party in the Hungarian partiament in the Hungarian parliament, it is reported here this week. During the debate on the bill for abolishing the equality of

the Jewish religion in Hungary, which is reported in the Voelkischer Beobachter, the deputy expressed "pained regret at the degredation of the Jewish confession." He greeted as a "welcome sign the fact that anti-Semitism among the Hungarian people is decreasing."


J.W.B. to Help **Raise War Fund**
