# VETERAN BUSINESS MAN EIGHTY YEARS.

#### M. Ohlman, in Business in Meadville Thirty-nine Years.

People who see Melius Ohlman, the veteran clothier, walking to and from his place of business every week day in the year, can scarcely believe that he has lived 80 years, but such is a fact. Last week Mr. Ohlman passed the 80th milestone, and he is a man remarkably

well preserved, both mentally and physically.

Mr. Ohlman was born in Germany, June 7, 1834. In the year of 1854, at the age of 20 years, he decided to leave his native land and settle in America. He first located in Greenville.

In the year of 1858, Mr. Ohlman embarked in the clothing business at Conneautville, and in 1860 returned to Germany to claim the maiden of his choice as a life companion, and the union has been a most happy one.

A sad feature of the hour is the fact that Mrs. Ohlman is lying very ill at her home on South Water street and fears are entertained for her recovery.

In the spring of 1875 Mr. Ohlman came to Meadville to continue in the clothing business. He had a partner, Mr. Kingsbacher, and the firm was we'll known in the city under the firm name of Ohlman and Kingsbacher. Later the junior partner disposed of his interests to Mr. Ohlman and the firm name of M. Ohlman and Son took its place, and the store has occupied quarters in the Lafayette Block for 38 years.

The celebration was held to commemorate the granting of the Charter to the Young Men's Hebrew Association of Pittsburgh, and also served as a closing program for the successful 1913-14 season. Several hundred members attended.

Chief among the interests of the evening was the exhibition of the Charter. Inis has been transcribed beautifully and placed in a rich mission frame 4 feet by three feet wide. The entire effect is pleasing in the extreme, and caused much favorable comment.

The Charter will make a fine appearance, and be an article of continual interest when hung in the Y. M. H. A. The presentation speech was made by S. J. Horvitz, who with Peter Glick, had represented the Association in applying for the Charter.

President Harry J. Applestein, made the speech of acceptance, and also acted as Toastmaster. He touched briefly upon the history of the Y. M. H. A. and explained the causes for the delay in making application for the Charter. No difficulty was encountered after the application was made. After expressing his appreciation, in behalf of the Association, to those instrumental in securing the charter, President Applestein spoke of the advantages of being a chartered organization.

On the entertaining side of the program, Frank E. O'Brien, self-styled the "Irish Duke," pleased greatly with his "Irish" character stories and songs. Count Goldstein used his foreign twang and mannerisms to good effect in his playing and singing. N. Specter's piano playing added much to the evening's entertainment. The headliner, however, was the character singing of Peter Golden and Blondy Goldstein. This pair furnished some high class entertainment, and the gathering was not slow in showing its appreciation. Their work was roundly applauded.
