Wm. Smyser to Speak To Rodef Shalom Jr. Congregation Sunday

William Smyser, career diplomat and political Science Lecturer at the Wharton School of Finance, University of Pennsylvania, will appear in Pittsburgh on Sunday, February 8 at 8:30 p.m. in the auditorium at the Devonshire St. entrance to the Rodef Shalom Temple.

Mr. Smyser's appearance will be sponsored by the Junior Congregation in the first series concerning world affairs, and will be followed in March by the appearance of James A. Michener, Pulitzer prize-winner and author of **Tales of the South Pacific**.

Mr. Smyser will speak on "Tomorrow's Continent—Africa," the growing pains which now plague this great continent and the importance of its raw materials, resources, gold, copper, diamonds, uranium and manpower.

A career diplomat of wide experience in Europe and Asia, William Smyser has spent his adult years analyzing the economic riches and political ills of many lands. After eighteen years in embassies and consulates around the world, he resigned from the United States Foreign Service in 1951 "to become reacquainted with my own country," as he says.
