An Absolut success

When Burton Morris was just 8 years old, he scribbled pictures in the hopes of making people happy.

"I loved everything that had to do with art, and I was always experimenting, trying new things," he said. "I liked it when my work got people excited."

Now 29, this Pittsburgh artist has a lot to be smiling about, as one of his creations will soon be appearing in USA Today for about 7 million people to enjoy. Morris, of Shadyside, was selected by Absolut Vodka as the single artist representing Pennsylvania in a national program called "Absolut Statehood."

About two years ago, Absolut commissioned 51 American artists -- one from each state and the District of Columbia -- to develop works that depict their visions of the states. The campaign, which runs bi-weekly ads in USA Today, kicked off with "Absolut Alabama" in January 1992 and will finish with "Absolut Wyoming" in December. Morris's "Absolut Pennsylvania" will appear July 1.

"It's an honor to be part of the widely-recognized group Absolut chose," the 1986 Carnegie Mellon graduate said. "It's also artwork that's helping others, and that's something I enjoy."

Each artist will be selling 300 signed and numbered lithographs at a cost of \$300 per piece. The sale will benefit the Design Industries Foundation for AIDS, a cause that both Absolut and Morris want to support.

"Anything that I can do to help others is something that I'm interested in," Morris said.

Absolut has always been involved in the arts and in charity, said Michel Roux, president and CEO of Carillon Importers, the company that imports the Swedish spirit.

"There are so many people out there aspiring to create art who don't have the means to do it," Roux said. "In 'Absolut Statehood' we found a clever way to do business, support a cause and involve art at the same time."

Roux said he considered about 16 well-known Pennsylvania artists before selecting Morris. He said Morris's sketches best represented the state.

"Burton has a unique style that really shows the Keystone," he said. "I like his individuality and the way the piece was done."

Morris's piece won't be unveiled until after it is reproduced in the full-page, color USA Today ad, but he said the work is indicative of his bold, exciting style.

"I thought a lot about what the state means to me and how I could show it with my style in an Absolut bottle," he said. "I made it with energetic lines because that's what I think Pennsylvania represents."

Morris, the son of Marvin and Benita Morris of Churchill, said he researched the state and its landmarks, finding symbols that best described the state. He said he especially didn't want Pittsburgh to be seen as a dying steel town.

"Too many people just think Pittsburgh equals steel mills," he said. "I wanted to push the idea that the city and state are growing, getting bigger and better."

"I wanted them to look at the Point and Liberty Bell and say, 'Wow -- this is exciting.'"

Absolut's Roux will be in town next week for the unveiling of "Absolut Pennsylvania." On July 1 from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m., the piece and several other Morris works will be shown at Gallery G, 211 9th St.

Gallery G owner Carol Siegel said she expects about 200 people to attend the show entitled "Absolut(ty)," and added that art lovers are in for a treat.

"His work is stylized, playful and full of energy," she said. "Many of the other artists (Absolut chose) have really taken off, so this could be a turning point for Burton."

Morris's collection will be displayed at Gallery G until August 2, and after that Morris said he will continue pursuing his artistic career. He said he wants to try new art forms and will always be searching for creative ideas.

"As an artist I think I'll always be pushing to try new things," he said. "I want to explore the art world and experiment as much as I can."

Dor L'Dor School names Frank as coordinator

Malke Steinfeld Frank has been appointed education coordinator of Dor L'Dor School according to Wendy Hardman and Bruce Ledewitz, co-chairpersons of Dor L'Dor.

Begun seven years ago by parents of Dor Hadash Congregation, the school now has 50 students from kindergarten through seventh grade.

Malke brings to Dor L'Dor many years of experience in the field of Jewish and early childhood education. Previously, she served as principal of Beth Israel Center in Pleasant Hills and B'nai Israel Jewish Learning Center. She has taught in the Headstart Program for the Pittsburgh Public Schools and at many schools of Jewish learning in the Pittsburgh area.

During a recent move to Oklahoma City, OK, with her husband, Dr. Ivan Frank, Malke created and directed a Jewish Resource Center which provided educational services to both the Jewish community and non-Jewish community.

At the Jewish Community Center Preschool, Malke is the Hebrew specialist, having developed a curriculum for teaching Hebrew and holidays through Creative Movement. She studied this field and dance therapy while living in Israel for 10 years with her family. She teaches Israel Folk Dance to schools serviced by the Jewish Education Institute and is the coordinator of the Dance Network of the Coalition for Advancement in Jewish Education.
