One of the most prominent features of the work as undertaken by the Hebrew Sheltering Guardian Society is the establishment of local committees in the various Jewish towns and villages. Mr. Jacob Bahein will be the general agent, and will organize local committees whenever it will be deemed necessary. The local committees will consist of three of the most prominent Jews of a locality and of two lady volunteer workers, who will help in the visiting of the families that make application for receiving children for board or for adoption.

There will be a distinct understanding that only such families are eligible as will show to the satisfaction of the local committees and to the satisfaction of the agent that they are likely to give to the children boarded or placed out with them the best possible parental care and attention. Furthermore, only such families will be considered whose reputation for honesty and morality is beyond the slightest question.

Isaac Lehman.

One of the most prominent and highly respected citizens of our community passed away in the death of Isaac Lehman, which occurred at his home in Buena Vista street, Allegheny, last Sunday afternoon. While Mr. Lehman had been in rather ill health for some time yet the news of his death came as a profound shock to his numerous friends and acquaintances.

Mr. Lehman was born in Dieberg, Germany, in 1824 and came to this country when he was 25 years old. He first located in Baltimore, but remained only a brief period in that city, shortly coming to Pittsburg. He established himself in the wholesale clothing business at Sixth avenue and Liberty street. He retired from the active cares of business some years ago, his advancing age and health not permitting him to identify himself too closely with the duties incumbent upon a man in that position.

Isaac Lehman always took an active part in our communal life and he was at all times closely affiliated with our leading Jewish organizations. He was a quiet, unassuming man, who went through life doing his duty and living in a manner which gained for him the respect and esteem of his fellow citizens. For many years he had been a director of congregation Rodeph Shalom and treasurer of the Concordia Club. His name was found on the roll of all our charity organizations. He belonged to the Independent Order of B'nai B'rith, Heptasophs, A. O. U. W. and the Masonic fraternity.

ZIONIST NOTES.

A large and enthusiastic audience was present at the Washington Street Synagogue last Sunday evening on the occasion of the mass meeting held to receive the report of the delegates to the Philadelphia convention. Dr. S. Bloomberg presided. Addresses were delivered by Mr. Chas. W. London, of Baltimore, a member of the Executive Committee of the Federation of American Zionists; Mr. Henry Jackson, Mr. Morris Neaman, Mr. Samuel Horvitz, a Harvard University student, and Mr. Benjamin Lichter, a student of Columbia University and Jewish Theological Seminary of New York. Rev. S. Graffman and Rev. J. Bloom sang solos and Prof. H. Alderman rendered a violin solo.

The Gems of Zion Society of McKeesport held its first annual picnic last Tuesday at Olympia Park. The affair was well attended and was a grand success socially and financially.

The Tiphereth Zion Society will hold a meeting at the Institute on Sunday evening, July 2, for the purpose of receiving the reports of its delegates to the Philadelphia convention. The public is cordially invited to attend.

A moonlight boat excursion on the steamer Beauty will be held on Tuesday evening, July 11. The affair is being arranged by the Daughters of Zion and Tiphereth Zion societies. The proceeds will be donated to the gymnasium fund.

The following societies will meet at the Institute on Sunday evening, July 2: Zion Literary, Lilies of Zion, Ahawath Zion, Shoshanath Zion and Tiphereth Zion.

The Yiddish Propaganda Committee has donated \$25 to the Institute, \$25 for the purchase of Hebrew books

for the library, and has purchased four shares of the Jewish Colonial Trust for its affiliated organizations. The money was realized at the recent mass meeting held in the Beth Jacob Synagogue and is being judiciously expended.

Roumanian Lebanon Society.

The Roumanian Lebanon Society will give a musical entertainment on Sunday evening, July 2, 1905, at 8 o'clock at Ohel Jacob Synagogue, 77 Roberts street, Pittsburg. The orchestra and choir on that occasion will be conducted by Prof. N. Silverman, addresses will be delivered by a number of prominent speakers and an admission fee of 25 cents will be charged, the proceeds to go to charity.

The Roumanian Lebanon Society consists of the better element of the Roumanian Jews, many of whom were compelled to emigrate from their native land and seek the freedom of America on account of the religious intolerance and persecution to which they were subjected. In 1900 several thousand of these immigrants were scattered throughout the United States, one large group arriving in this city where their welfare was looked after by a committee of five, consisting of Samuel Shefler, Rev. M. S. Sivitz, H. Greenberg, B. Sher and M. Sachs. They were assisted financially and within a short time had secured employment and had become self-sustaining. Being possessed of a better education than the average immigrant, they had little trouble in adapting themselves to the manners and customs of this country, and in April, 1901, organized the Roumanian Lebanon Society for the purpose of assisting, not only its own members, but to distribute charity generally to those who might be in need of help.

Mr. Julius Sand was its first President, April, 1901, to April, 1903; Mr. B. Chaimovitz was its President from April, 1903 to April 1905, and Mr. Sol Lieblich is its present President. During the past four years a large number of worthy poor have received financial assistance, as well as moral support, from the society, and its philanthropic endeavors have resulted in much good to the Jews of what is known as the "Hill District."

O. H. Rosenbaum is its Honorary President and other prominent honorary members are: A. Lippman, Rev. M. S. Sivitz, A. H. Abrams, of this city; David M. Bressler, G. David and A. Guttman, of New York.
