## **Obituaries** Joe Goldstein, his vigor & humor bred a leader

Joseph Goldstein, who died at age 87 on Saturday, was a builder and a leader of the Pittsburgh Jewish Community, and an American success story in the field of business.

Born in Pittsburgh Nov. 1, 1888, Mr. Goldstein grew and developed with his city. His family and friends remember being uplifted time and again by his good humor, his unerring native ability to turn frowns into smiles with a joke, his warmth, and his understanding.

Mr. Goldstein. a founder and former president of Giant Eagle Markets, worked his way up to the top, starting at 16, selling groceries.

His drive for success in business didn't get in the way of human concerns. Mr. Goldstein took a personal interest in human problems in an age when personal involvement was beginning to thin out.

Instead, he took an active role in directly helping those in personal need and rose to president of the Hebrew Free Loan Association. He was a life trustee of the United Jewish Fund, predecessor of the United Jewish Federation of Greater Pittsburgh, a member of the Montefiore Hospital board, the Pittsburgh Jewish Community Center (formerly the YM & WHA).

Mr. Goldstein was a charter member of the B'nai Israel Synagogue and was buried in B'nai Israel Cemetery. Burial was from the Burton Hirsch Funeral Home.

In 1917, Mr. Goldstein was one of the founders of Eagle Grocery Company. The successful firm expanded to 125 outlets and was bought by Kroger Company.

In 1931, he became a member of the O.K. Grocery Firm, which opened one of the early self-service stores on Brownsville Road, Pittsburgh. Later, the chain evolved into Giant Eagle Markets Inc., with Mr. Goldstein its president for many years.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Dora Goldstein; two daughters Mrs. Frieda Shapira, of Pittsburgh, and Mrs. Leah Zibbell, of Scarsdale, N.Y., a son, Dr. Morris Goldstein, of Los Angeles; 11 grandchildren; and five greatgrandchildren.






