"The death of David Glick at 68 was unexpected sad news for a host of Pittsburghers who counted him as a friend. He had that rare capacity to give himself genuinely both to great causes and to individual human beings. As a public-spirited citizen and an able lawyer, he served his community well—as a board member of the Henry Clay Frick Education Foundation, as president of the Foreign Policy Association, as president of The Allegheny County Bar Association and in other positions of civic leadership. One of his most notable services was the part he played in making possible the immigration of thousands of Jews from Nazi Germany.

"As a gentle scholar and a courteous compassionate man, David Glick enriched the lives of those he met. His passing will be mourned by those who knew him and felt by many who didn't know him but who were affected by his good works."
