Our Kindergarten is now licensed by the State, meeting all standards as regards staff, school plant equipment, materials, program and health.

Our classes are in session Monday through Friday from 9 to 12 noon. Mrs. S. M. Levin is again our teacher and is conducting the Kindergarten in her usual genial fashion. There is a well-rounded curriculum with a few new innovations, such as the Rhythm Band and painting at easels.

So far this year donations have been made by Mrs. Forrest Raffel, who donated a record player to the Kindergarten.

The tuition is still \$10.00 per month as that is the standard fee in kinder-gartens in this community and it is necessary to meet the prevailing fee. However, we find that we are, because of

limited funds, in need of many items which members could possibly supply. These things need not be new but equipment that is in fair condition would help immeasureably to keep the Kindergarten in a good, wholesome condition.
