Message from Mothers' Club

With the dedication of our new Synagogue, I feel proud to have had a small part in its achievement.

The Mothers' Club has as its object the furtherance of Judaism, the moral advancement of this community, and an active participation in all endeavors of the Congregation.

With these aims in view, we have worked untiringly to aid the Congregation. We planned plenty of classrooms for the Sunday School, which we sponsor and maintain. History of Kneseth Israel Congregation

Almost a half century ago a handful of Jews walked from Kittanning and from Ford City to the village of Manorville, where they met with the few Jewish families who lived there at the time to hold services for The High Holidays. The year was 1905—the group was really the nucleus of Kneseth Israel Congregation, though not one or the worshippers was aware of the fact. For several years these men met to pray on the New Year and Day of Atonement, first in Manorville and then in Kittanning. The pioneer group included the following: Mr. Abe Adelson, Mr. Charles Adelson, Mr. Morris N. Adelson, Mr. Abe Caplan, Mr. Harry Friedman (shochet from Ford City), Mr. Arthur Gruskin, Mr. Ike Gruskin, Mr. John Gruskin, Mr. Harry Lurie, Mr. Dave Pollock, Mr. Louis Pollock, Mr. Israel Rambach, Mr. Sam Rambach, and Mr. Meyer Silberblatt, a few of whom are with us today and most of whom are close relatives of many of our present members. The first president of the Kittanning group was Mr. Israel Rambach; Mr. Morris N. Adelson was vice-president.

By 1911 the Jewish community of Kittanning had become definitely organized, calling themselves very fittingly "Kneseth Israel" — gathering together in Israel. Records of 1912 show the following officers: President, J. L. Apple; Vice-president, A. S. Gruskin; Secretary, Louis Lesser; Treasurer, I. Rambach, and about fifteen members. They employed Rabbi Dolgoff, their first full time cantor, shochet, and Hebrew teacher at \$40 monthly. He and his wife made their home on South Jefferson Street, where he conducted Hebrew classes for the children. All religious services were held in the Odd Fellows Hall on Jacob Street. The same officers

continued year after year with the exception of the secretary, Mr. Lesser, who left the community in 1914 and was succeeded by Mr. H. Lurie who served as secretary for ten years. As for the other officers — Mr. J. L. Apple held the presidency for almost thirty-five years, both Mr. A. S. Gruskin and Mr. I. Rambach remained in their capacities during their lifetimes. Dues were \$6 monthly with deficits made up at the end of the year by contributions of members; there were always deficits. In direct contrast to the officers, who patiently served from year to year, was the fast turnover of shochet and Hebrew teacher. The names of those who succeeded Rabbi Dolgoff included: Rabbis Friedman, Reiches, Spivak and Ruttenberg.

In 1912 the Jewish women of the community formed their Mothers' Club; not only a social organization, but one founded to carry on the traditions of Judaism, to aid the congregation whenever possible, and finally to establish and maintain a Sunday Religious School for the Jewish children of the community. The original officers were: President, Mrs. J. L. Apple, who held the office for almost thirty years; Vice-President, Mrs. A. S. Gruskin, who also served for an extended term; and Secretary-Treasur-



er, Mrs. M. N. Adelson, who remained in the secretarial position for twenty-eight years. Some years later, when the treasurer became a separate unit, Mrs. I. Pollock held the office for many terms.

About 1914 the Congregation moved its quarters to the second floor of the Academy Building on North Jefferson Street. The new location was used for all meetings, services, Hebrew School, and Sunday School which came into being about this time. Mrs. Sidney Kaufman consented to supervise the Sunday School which she did until she left this community. Her work was continued by young women of the community and finally by

various mothers who were members of Mothers' Club. Young men and women and also mothers and fathers became volunteer teachers. The Sunday School for a long period was affiliated with and under the supervision of the Council of Jewish Women, but during the depression years, when membership became a financial burden, this affiliation ceased.

In 1918 the Congregation had the foresight and marvelous courage to purchase a house on North Water Street for \$4,000. There were no funds and the building was mortgaged for the full amount through the Armstrong County Trust Company. The \$700 raised by contributions at this time was used to convert the home for use as a synagogue, meeting place, Cheder, and Sunday School. The remodeling was done by Contractor Young of West Kittanning. The pews came from a church in Butler. Now a charter was secured and Kneseth Israel had its own home. There was only one difficulty — the mortgage had to be paid. Dues were raised to \$8 monthly

with an additional charge for each child enrolled in the Hebrew School. The Congregation was constantly in financial straits and the Mothers' Club came to the rescue many times. The women raised money for every necessary improvement and expenditure for maintenance; they worked unceasingly on projects of all kinds. These were difficult years — progress was slow, but every effort brought the workers a little closer to the goal. Finally they were successful; the mortgage was paid in full on September 5, 1941.

Many times in the ensuing years — those years in which the following men succeeded each other as presidents of the congregation: Mr. Louis Gruskin, Mr. Maurice Harris, Mr. Harry Pollock, Mr. Phillip Mervis, and Mr. Bernard Adelson — there was talk of the need for a new building. During this period the leadership of Mothers' Club was held respectively by: Mrs. Reuben Karp, Mrs. Abe Siegel, Mrs. Charles Hampton, Mrs. Dave Apple, Mrs. Morris Finesod, Mrs. Sam Parnes, and Mrs. Martin Gross; the Congregation employed: Rabbis Holtzman, Levy, Zakuto, Weiner, Cohen, and Schwartzman. Everyone felt the necessity of improved quarters for Kneseth Israel and occasionally there was a spurt of action such as a Building Fund Drive, but no full fledged attempt was actually begun until the night of November 14, 1951, when a community meeting was held in the social hall of the old Synagogue. President Bernard Adelson presided over the meet-

ing at which fifty-two people were present. It was stressd that this was not a meeting for the congregation only; this gathering was for all Jews of the community. After much discussion tentative building plans were suggested, a committee appointed, and pledges to the amount of \$25,000 were actually made that night. There were many obstacles; the original committee disbanded and a new one was formed. Headed by Mr. Abe Chinn, a dynamic worker and comparative new comer to this community, this group through their unceasing efforts overcame all obstacles and Ground Breaking Ceremonies for the new Kneseth Israel Synagogue took place on Jan-

uary 25, 1953. The old building was used until the new one, built right behind it, was almost completed. The new Synagogue was available for the New Year Services of 1953, and several times before for Bar Mitzva celebrations even though it wasn't entirely ready for use. The committee and trustees continued their efforts; the 'handy men" of the Congregation spent thousands of working hours laying tile, placing units, aiding the carpenters; the women added their efforts — everyone had a hand in working for the new building to which he had so long looked forward. Just at this time the congregation employed our present religious leader, Rabbi Gerald Lerer.


With the dedication of a new edifice Kneseth Israel looks forward to




