Respected Orthodox leaders are solemnly promising to bring to the bar of justice such culpits as try to undersell their religious goods. After all, there is an NRA and a code. What a pleasant sight and sound for Christian ears! Wise, a co-chairman of the United Jewish Appeal, at the national offices of the organization in the Pershing Square Building, New York City. This community, according to the writer of the report, Carl H. Alsberg who assumed the leadership in this effort to raise his community's share in the nation-wide campaign, has only three Jewish families. Yet he was able to obtain, he said, \$438, — the bulk of these contributions being made by Christians.

"In connection with raising funds for the United Jewish Appeal for aid of the Jews of Germany," Mr. Als-berg wrote, "I took the liberty of ap-pointing myself a committee of one and have just completed my campaign.

"I am enclosing herewith a check for \$438 representing the contribu-tions of this community.

"I consider this contribution rather remarkable in view of the fact that to my knowledge there are only three Jewish families in Franklin and the bulk of my gifts came from Gentile friends."
