Think Legislative Program Saved by Zionist Resolution

Congressmen Remaining in Capital to Register Vote for Resolution Will be Kept as Long as Possible to Maintain Quorum for Other Legislation

Washington (J. T. A.)—It appears that the question of the Jewish Palestine has come to the rescue of the American legislative program, majority leader Mondell frankly admitting to friends of the resolution that he was holding off the vote as long as possible so that he might keep in the city the more than 50 Congressmen who are remaining in the Capital to register their vote in favor of the resolution.

Having promised at the beginning of the week that the vote on the Fish Resolution would come up Wednesday or Thursday, the Republican leaders who are anxious to dispose of pending legislation before the House adjourns, said a quorum would be lost if the friends of the Zionist resolution departed from the city immediately upon its passage.

Friends of the resolution have been assured by Representative Mondell, however, that it would positively be voted upon not later than Friday, even if the House remain in session longer.

The debate on the resolution will be cut down from two to one hour, it is understood, and there is keen competition among Congressmen for participation in the debate. It is understood that besides Representatives Fish, of New York; Fess and Burton, of Ohio; Cooper, of Milwaukee; Chanler, of New York, the Jewish Congressmen Rosedale, Siegel and Perlman will also speak, but will take only about three minutes in deference to their Gentile colleagues. There has been no indication so far, of anyone

speaking in opposition to the resolution, although there are rumors that the opposition will have at least one spokesman.
