300 Attend Dedication of Jeannette's First Synagogue

Rabbi Morris Baker conducted the religious services in connection with the dedication of the first Jewish Synagogue built in Jeannette, Pa., the Chevra Sholom Synagogue (Congregation of Peace.)

On Sunday evening, August 27, at 5:00 o'clock, the key to the door of the Synagogue was purchased by Benjamin and Theodore Levin and Mrs. Ida Shoag in honor of their parents, who then opened the door. Mrs. Charles Ratner bought the honor of cutting the ribbon to the vestibule door.

During the services, the eternal light of life was unveiled by Dr. A. Jablonsky and lit by his mother, Mrs. B. N. Jablonsky in memory of their father and husband respectively. A large memorial tablet was unveiled by Mr. Morris Bloom of Columbus,

Ohio, father of Samuel Bloom of Jeannette, erected in memory of the deceased parents of Mrs. Bloom and the Mother of Mr. Bloom.

In the course of the religious services, Rabbi Baker offered prayers for world peace and for the preservation of our great democracy, eulogizing our founding fathers of this country.

After the services, the assembly of about 300 persons gathered in the downstairs social hall for a supper banquet, which was opened with the singing of America. Attorney Theodore Levin acted as toastmaster.

Dr. Joseph Shapiro, rabbi of the Poale Zedeck Synagogue, Pittsburgh, was the main speaker. His topic was "The Influence of the Synagogue in Jewish History Throughout the Ages." Supplementing the main speaker was a diversified program of music and speakers. Rev. E. Zalulkowski, Cantor of the Beth Shalom Synagogue of Pittsburgh, rendered Jewish folk and religious songs and was called back for encores many times. He was accompanied at the piano by Miss Esther Adler. Mr. Frank Apter of the Stanley Symphony Orchestra pleased the large gathering with his renditions of classical and semi-classical music on the violin, accompanied by Mr. Harry M. Nossokoff of Pittsburgh.

Rev. I. Horowitz of the Rodef Sholom Synagogue of Johnstown gave the benediction after the banquet and moved the audience emotionally with his special prayer song in dedication of the new synagogue.

Eloquent speeches were delivered by Rabbi Morris Baker of the local Synagogue; William Davis, president of the congregation; Mrs. Samuel Bloom, president of the Chevra Sholom Sisterhood; and Mrs. Abe Caplan of Pittsburgh. The Chairman of every committee was introduced to the audience.

Telegrams of congratulation were read from Greensburg, Pa.; Miami Beach, Florida; Hollywood, California; and Danville, Ill.

At the entire completion of the interior of the Synagogue, open house will be held. Announcements will be made at a later date.
