JOHN L. BERSTEIN ELECTED PRESIDENT OF THE HE-BREW SHELTERING AND IMMIGRANT AID SOCIETY OF AMER-ICA.

New York.—The Board of Directors of the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society of America have unanimously elected Mr. John L. Bernstein, a lawyer and well known communal worker as president of the Society.

Mr. Bernstein has done valuable Mr. Bernstein has done valuable work for Jewish immigrants and is one of the most active workers of the Society, having been its Honorary Secretary. Chairman of the Law Committee and a member of other important committees. He has appealed many cases of immigrant Jews threatened with deportation and has taken up gratuitously many cases of habeas corpus proceedings in which he has been uniformly successful.

Mr. Bernstein was born May 10 1872, in Niesen, Russia. He came to America in 1890, and his first experiences were similar to those of all Jewish immigrants who came to America penniless. He is an ardent supporter of the cause of Jewish nationalism and has been a member of the Evecutive Committee of the Order Sons of Zion, and the Chairman of its Organization Committee.

STROYED BY FIRE.
Copenhagen.—Fifty-eight houses were destroyed by fire in Iltani, a village near the border of Courland and a few hundred Jewish and Lettish families were left without shelier. The fire, the origin of which is unknown, left only nine houses in the whole village, destroying the Shul before it was checked.

In the village of Kolna, County of Lomzsh, fire destroyed twenty houses among them the local of the Jewish Literary Association. The library of the local contained more than seven hundred volumes, all of which were burned, making the loss in this one house more than 3,000 marks.

A fire which occurred in the village of Yezsharna, alongside of the tracks of the Willanav railway, destroyed all of the houses on the right side of the tracks. The loss was about 70,000 marks.
