BOARD APPROVES BUILDING PLANS, BID, SUBJECT TO CONDITIONS

The Beth Israel Center Executive Board concluded its special meeting August 8th at the home of Past-President Jacques Weiss by unanimously approving the following motion by Vice-President Joseph Markowitz:

"Beth Israel Center accepts the final set of building plans presented at this meeting by the Building Committee, and the bids for various portions of the work presented by Wm. R. Schwartzmiller, Inc. subject to the following conditions:

1) Approval of the General Membership;

2) Completion of the plans in a form suitable for submission to the Bank, at no additional cost to the Center;

3) Approval of the plans and the contractor by the Bank; and 4) Obtaining the necessary funds in loans, gifts or collections.

Mr. Schwartzmiller's bid was for \$77,653 for the building, plus \$3000 for the grading, \$3000 for the sewer line, and \$2800 for the

glass and glazing, making a total of \$86,473.

The set of plans conditionally approved by the Board was the sixth that had come under careful consideration. It calls for a 7800-squarefoot building consisting of patterned cinder block faced with Miami Stone. There is a classroom wing, 104 by 42 feet, containing 8 class-rooms of assorted sizes, as well as an office, utilities, sanitary facilities and an unfinished but roughed-in kitchen. This is attached to a portion of the building measuring 50 by 70 feet, containing the main sanctuary as well as two small classrooms on either side of the Bimah. The main entrance is in the classroom wing, at its junction with the main sanctuary. The building therefore contains a total of 10 classrooms, as well as the main sanctuary.

Floors will initially be concrete, except in the rest rooms, where vinyl tile is required. The flat roof will be 5-ply tar covered with slag. The present contract calls for installation of ceilings in all rooms except the kitchen; these will be 14 feet high in the

sanctuary, and 8 feet high in the classroom wing.

Acceptance of these plans by the Board implies rejection of a building of Butler-type construction, in which prefabricated panels are attached to arched steel beams. The Board examined plans of a Butler-type building with layout, facilities and size comparable to the design accepted. The lowest bid on this building was approximately \$5000 higher than the figures quoted above. A smaller Butler building was also considered, but found to be inadequate for our needs.

Both the Board and the Building Committee expressed regret that it is impossible to build an adequate building for the \$75,000 previously authorized. They agreed that little could be gained in attempting to reduce the size or facilities in order to lower the price. Most easy economies have already been taken, and any further significant reduction would seriously impair the usefulness of the building.
A special meeting will be called shortly to request the approval
of the plans and contract by the General Membership.

BUILDING GIFTS

There will be many opportunities during the construction of the building to donate specific items. One such gift, \$200 for the panelling behind the Bimah, given by Mrs. Selda W. Simon, was announced last month. This month, we have several new gifts to announce.

A Torah Cover has been presented oy Dr. and Mrs. Jacques Weiss, in memory of Dr. Weiss' father, Louis

Weiss.

Mr. and Mrs. Max Pearlstein have donated the glass for the building, as well as arranged for reduced prices for the glazing. Mr. Pearlstein is associated with the United Plate Glass Co. The value of this gift is estimated at \$3000.

Mr. and Mrs. Philip Blau, of Miami Stone of Pennsylvania, Inc., have arranged for a reduced price on the facing material. The value of this gift is estimated at \$250.

Mrs. Rose Harris and family have commissioned two original sculptures to be created especially for Beth Israel Center. A silver sculpture, for the Eternal Light, is being created by the nationally-known sculptor, Daniel Blumberg of Philadelphia. A sculpture for the exterior of the building will be executed by Virgil Cantini of Pittsburgh.

Among the items still available for those wishing to make a specific donation are a placque for the front of the building, the decorative rear wall or floor of the foyer, vinyl tile for the classrooms and corridor floors, bookcases, coat racks, and various

portions of the Bimah.

RULES COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS PASSAGE OF AMENDMENT

The Rules Committee has decided to recommend to the General Membership the passage, at the next General Meeting, of the amendment to the by-laws proposed by Joseph Markowitz. The wording of this amendment, which was referred to the Rules Committee at the Spring General Meeting, is as follows:

"The Board shall have the discretion, subject to the will of the Membership, to define special categories of membership, and shall have the discretion to schedule dues and other payments required of members."

This amendment will permit the establishment of an 'associate member rank, in addition to that of regular member. The Membership Committee has reported that there are several prospective associate members who, due to commitments to other congregations, feel that they are unable to contribute full dues as well as the standard building fund contribution. Nevertheless, they wish to maintain ties with the community.

These people would represent a definite gain to the Center, and they should be encouraged to join. Once the amendment to the By-laws is passed, the Membership will be asked to pass on the dues or building fund exemptions, privileges, and qualifications of associate membership. It is expected that associate membership will be available only to those who are full members elsewhere, and will not carry the privilege of enrollment in the schools.
