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## PICK BENNO RABINOF FOR CONCERT SERIES

Russian - American Violinist  
Brought Into Limelight  
By Leopold Auer

### PRAISED BY CRITICS

Benno Rabinof, sensational Russian-American violinist, whose favorable press criticisms constitute a veritable path of glory wherever he has played, has been secured by the "Y" Musical Society Committee, as the fifth of their Major Artist presentations, to augment the four previously selected: Dino Borgioli, leading tenor of La Scala opera, Milan and the Royal Opera, Rome; Robert Goldsand, famous nineteen year old Vienesse pianist; Editha Fleischer, outstanding soprano of the Metropolitan Opera Company; and Gregor Piatigorsky, 'cellist, in a return engagement. In addition to the major artists, the Musical Society subscription program will include two chamber music concerts, and two concerts by the "Y" Choral Society.

Rabinof was first brought into the musical limelight by no less a personage than the famous Leopold Auer, whose ability to recognize musical genius is a byword in the musical world. It was under the active sponsorship of Professor Auer

Latowa Club Meets Evergreen  
In Finals After Weeks  
Of Competition

### EXPERIENCED DEBATERS

After weeks of strenuous competition, encountering the stiffest opposition from the strong teams entered in the contest, the two finalists in the Congress of Clubs Debating League—the Evergreen and Latowa Clubs—are set to exchange verbal blows in the closing match of the season, to be held in the Lodge Room, this Thursday evening at 8:15 o'clock. To the winner of the final match will go the honor of being the first organization to have its name inscribed on the trophy being donated by the A. P. Moore Club, one of the oldest and most active of the constituent groups of the Congress of Clubs. Two weeks have passed since the two finalists were selected, thus giving adequate time to both contestants to add to and perfect their arguments.

Due to the exigencies encountered in drawing up the pairings in first matches in the tournament, the final tilt finds the Latowa Club with three victories to its credit, while the Evergreens have defeated only two opponents in their quest for the title. With two experienced and talented speakers as representatives, the girls of the Latowa Club, Beatrice Cohen and Ruth Glick, hold decisions over the Comitass Club, Louis Littles, and Tau Sigma Kappa. The Latowas are conceded a fine chance to come through in the finals and thus be the first girls' club to come out on top in a competition, open to boys' and girls' clubs.

The Evergreens, represented by two likewise experienced debaters, Sam Kaufmann and Harry Wagner, overcame the opposition of the Panthers and the Fellowship Club on their way to the finals. Their feat in disposing of the strong challenge of the Fellowship boys is looked upon as one of the surprises of the league season. With the benefits derived from added coaching, the Evergreens

## Summer Membership System Attracts Big Following of Swimming and Gym Lovers

With the summer season in the "Y" only two weeks old, the advantages of having a summer membership system is apparent, with many members of that type already enrolled. This novel idea has caught on with devotees of swimming and gymnasium activities, in whose interests this device was installed. All age groups are eligible to enjoy the advantages, including the use of the swimming pool and all gymnasium and locker privileges. The season for the "summer members" began June First and will continue through September fifteenth.

The fee for senior men has been

set at six dollars; intermediates and students, four dollars; senior women, three dollars; intermediate and student women, two dollars. Under this system, which will include a full schedule of mixed swimming parties as well as individual sessions almost every day in the week, a person may join and enjoy the privileges of the purest, cleanest, and most easily accessible swimming pool in the city at a cost slightly more than that entailed in visiting the public swimming pools a few times. Members are now being enrolled at the Information Desk where further information on the subject may be procured.
