

Big Double Bill at the Fulton

Studded with star names of the entertainment world, Universal's gay comedy musical film, "What's Cookin'," presents its session of mirth and melody on the screen of the Fulton Theatre which started Wednesday, April 22.

Ethel Barrymore in "The Corn Is Green," at Nixon Theatre

"The Corn Is Green," the Emlyn Williams play in which Ethel Barrymore has scored the outstanding success of her career, will play the Nixon Theatre for one week beginning Mon-

day night, April 27.

Written partially from the memories of the author's own youth, "The Corn Is Green" is a tender, heartwarming story of a forthright English school teacher who attempts to bring the benefits of education to a begrimed Welsh mining village. Meeting with opposition from the local gentry and indifferent success with her pupils, she is about to abandon the venture when she discovers a spark of genius in a truculent young miner. Under her guidance the lad wins an Oxford scholarship.

Miss Barrymore, of course, plays Miss Moffat, the teacher, and Richard Waring plays Morgan Evans, the brilliant Welsh boy. Edmond Breon, a noted English actor, makes his first local appearance as the Squire and Thelma Schnee plays the Cockney girl who gratifies her lust for life nearly at the expense of Miss Moffat's plans for Evans. Eva Leonard-Boyne plays a shop-lifter turned housekeeper and Esther Mitchell and Marcel Dill are seen as Miss Barrymore's aides in her ambitious project.


