where he is spiritual head of Temple Israel. Rabbi Fram is the first of the students of Israel A. Abrams, educational director of the Hehrew Institute of Pittsburgh, to become a rabbi. He has occupied the pulpits of the leading churches of Detroit as guest speaker, and has been active there in all progressive civic functions. He is distinguished as a world traveler, and was one of the first Americans to travel in Russia after the Revolution. He visited Palestine twice and was in Germany in 1937. His pamphlet "Inside Germany" has a circulation of hundreds of thousands.

The outdoor dedicatory exercises will be held, weather permitting, on the spacious front lawns and verandas of the Institute, with seating capacity for a large attendance, as well as abundant standing room. Greetings will be delivered by community leaders, and an attractive program has been arranged.

The celebration marks the 30th year since the Hebrew Institute first opened its doors on Wylie Avenue, November 7, 1916. Its charter, however dates back to the year 1913. Then a group of men inspired by Rabbi Aaron M. Ashinsky, under the leadership of the late Sol Rosenbloom, aided by the generous gift and support of the late Louis I. Aaron, and assisted by the late Albert Hanauer, Marcus Rauh, Isaac Seder and Morris Neaman, founded the Institute.

Israel A. Abrams has served as educational director of Hebrew Institute since its founding. Mr. Abrams will introduce Dr. Efros.

Ministry made public a communication addressed last year to the DAIA, informing the Jewish leaders that that provision under which only people of Catholic faith could enter the Military College has been lifted.

The Radical Party, which represents the liberal-democratic opposition to President Peron's government, has adopted a resolution condeming anti-Semitism in the country and calling for the solution of the Palestine problem in a "spirit of justice and equality within the principles of the Balfour Declaration." The party specifically denounced the recent attack upon a Jewish intern at a local medical school hospital and the threats made to three others.

The charge that the authorities are taking no action to apprehend and punish anti-Semitic students responsible for an attack upon Leonard Chaitlin, an intern at the local medical school's hospital, was this week revealed by La Prensa.

Store Celebrates 77th Anniversary

In the first postwar celebration of its founding, Boggs and Buhl launches its traditional anniversary event with the motto, "It's Good Luck for You."

Along with the continued progress that has seen this distinctive organization pass the 3/4 century mark in the Pittsburgh community, side by side, has gone constant application through the years of the hard work, the vision, the neighborly helpfulness instituted in the humble dry goods store of 1869 by its founders, Russell H. Starting from a stock of yard goods alone-aided and abetted by goodwill and good hard work-the firm of Boggs and Buhl grew and prospered through service to Pittsburghers, through 77 years into the modern department store of today on the North Side with complimentary service from two branch stores—one located at 2955-2965 West Liberty Avenue, Dormont, and another at 410 Bigham Street, Mt. 
