Vice President, Governor and Mayor Call on Juniors to Join Jewry

No person who is false to his nationality can be true to America, says Vice President Coolidge. Governor Miller says character hinges on religious influence, while Mayor Hylan expects the Jewish youth to respond.

New York, September 26. (J. T. A.)—Declaring that "No person who is false to his own nationality can be true to America," Vice-President Calvin Coolidge gave impetus to the "Join Week" campaign which was started yesterday by the Friedlander Educational Conference, aided by the Jewish Education Association. In a letter which was received by Judge Otto A. Rosalsky, honorary chairman of the campaign, the vice-president sent a stirring message to the Jewish youth of America whom the Friedlander Educational Conference is endeavoring to enroll this week in some organized Jewish activity—a club, class, study group or philanthropic body.

The Vice-President wrote:
