RESEARCH FACILITIES AVAILABLE TO MEDICAL AND HOUSE STAFFS

The Research Committee wishes to call attention to the fact that certain experimental facilities are available for use by members of the Medical and House Staffs who wish to carry out part-time research projects.

All staff members are invited and encouraged to utilize the research facilities as space and funds permit. While the Hospital intends that all research activities be self-supporting (grants or specific philanthropy), limited funds will be available to initiate projects when required.

Procedure for activating projects and securing financial support has been outlined as follows by Dr. Richard Abrams, Director, Research Department:

- 1. The Director of the Research Laboratories should be consulted in a preliminary way to ascertain that the facilities and space required are or can be made available.
- 2. If the project is feasible within our limitations, a protocol of the proposed project should be submitted to the research secretary for transmission to the Research Committee. This should include: (a) Brief title of project; (b) Specific aims; (c) Proposed methods of procedure; (d) Summary of previous work in area by yourself and others; (e) Facilities and personnel required; (f) Budget listing funds needed; and (g) Time required for completion.
- 3. In view of limitations in space, funds, and facilities, the Research Committee will review all applications in order to assess feasibility and priority. This is necessary only to the extent that these limitations are involved in the

proposed project. While this seems somewhat formal, it shall be the philosophy of the committee to aid the prospective researcher in overcoming roadblocks rather than to stand in his way.

PHYSICAL MEDICINE CHIEF TO ATTEND CONFERENCE

Dr. Samuel Sherman, Chief of the Department of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation, has arranged to attend the Conference on Lower Extremity Amputations during the week of March 26th at Northwestern University Medical School. The conference, conducted by the School's Department of Prosthetics, is sponsored by the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation, Washington, D. C.

Latest techniques and appliances utilized in the care and management of lower and extremity amputees will be presented at the conference.

NEW PHYSICAL THERAPY SECTION CONSTRUCTED

A new air-conditioned physical therapy section which permits greater latitude of work on the part of the therapist and improved service to patients has been constructed on the ground floor of the Main Building.

The section is equipped with an acoustical block ceiling which absorbs sound. Increased space has made it possible to add more equipment; a new special exercise table for lower extremity activities designed to strengthen joint and leg muscles; and extra treatment table for special exercise techniques and heat therapy; and a new hydrocollator unit to supplement the two already in use for keeping moist packs at a controlled heat level.

Each patient using the new physical-therapy facilities receives the treatment medically prescribed for him in an atmosphere of comfort and efficiency which helps maintain a high level of morale among patients as well as department personnel.

The Physical Therapy section works closely with Occupational Therapy which is to be enlarged and moved to new quarters this spring. New O.T. facilities will be adjacent to Physical Therapy permitting closer coordination of treatment. The location of both sections close to elevators will save considerable time for Escort Service personnel and provide faster, more convenient service for patients.

HEMATOLOGY COURSE PRESENTED

"Mechanisms of Anemia", the first of three lectures in the Post Graduate

Hematology Course conducted by Dr. Jay H. Silverberg, was presented Sunday, March 5th in the Nurses Residence.

Subsequent topics to be covered are Concept of Myeloproliferative Diseases, Rationale and Indications for Splenectomy scheduled for March 12th, 10-12 a.m.; and Thrombocytopenia, Coagulation Disorders, scheduled for March 19, 10-12 a.m.

Mr. Anthony Raguso, Assistant Director, Director of the Out-Patient Department, has been designated as a nominee to the American College of Hospital Administrators.

NEW CEILING, LIGHTING IN EMERGENCY CORRIDOR

New fluorescent lighting fixtures and a new acoustical block ceiling have been installed in the Emergency Room corridor on the ground floor.

The new ceiling, which conceals the maze of pipes overhead, provides better lighting and absorbs sound, has much improved the atmosphere of the entire section.

STAFF HEADS PRESENT LECTURE FOR X-RAY TECHNICIANS

Almost 100 guests attended the recent meeting of the Pennsylvania Society of X-ray Technicians (District 1) held in the Nurses Residence. Dr. Y.D. Koskoff, Chief of Neurosurgery, and Dr. H.W. Friedman, Radiology Chief, presented lectures on Chemopallidectomy to the technicians from hospitals in Pittsburgh and

outlying districts.

The subject was particularly interesting to X-ray personnel since Chemipallidectomy depends to a high degree on precision X-ray technique in pinpointing the area of the grain to be treated. This is not a routine procedure in all hospitals and members of the group were eager to learn of its development at Montefiore.

The X-ray Society meets once a month in one of the district hospitals to discuss new techniques in radiography.

SURGERY ASSOCIATE AT CLEVELAND CLINIC



NEW ENGLAND JOURNAL OF MEDICINE PUBLISHES STAFF REPORT

The Montefiore Hospital Hypertension Clinic in cooperation with the Pharmacy Department has performed a double blind study evaluating various antihypertensive agents. An article covering this work was published by Drs. Stanley E. Rosenbloom, Richard P. Shapera, Robert S. Goldbloom, and Jack Pincus of our Medical Staff in conjunction with Alvin P. Shapiro, Associate Professor, Department of Medicine, at the University of Pittsburgh. The article which appeared in the January 26, 1961 issue of the New England Journal of Medicine, was titled "Technic of Controlled Drug Assay, II. Comparison of Chlorothiazide, Hydrochlorothiazide and a Placebo in the Hypertensive Patient".

The hypotensive effects of chlorothiazide, hydrochlorothiazide and placebo were assayed in ambulatory patients with mild to moderately severe hypertension with the use of rigid principled of statistical design.

The study demonstrated that with a double-blind design combined with proper ramdom sampling a valid drug assay can be performed on a relatively small number of hypertensive subjects.

NEW HOSPITAL TELEPHONE NUMBERS ANNOUNCED

MONTEFIORE HOSPITAL HAS ANNOUNCED A CHANGE IN TELE-PHONE NUMBERS FROM MAYFLOWER 1-3400 TO MUSEUM 3-1100, EFFECTIVE APRIL 3rd AT 7:00 A.M.

The change was made necessary by the Hospital's continuous expansion of services to patients and their families and the resulting increase in needs. The new number will provide added telephone facilities not available under the previous arrangement.

After April 3rd, all calls to MAyflower 1-3400 will be automatically intercepted and the caller directed to dial the new number.

The private number for physicians calling the hospital will be changed from MAyflower 1-6030-31-32 to MUseum 3-5434 on April 3rd. The private line can be used for routine as well as emergency calls whether or not the main switchboard is busy. Operators have been alerted to answer calls coming in on this line before other calls.

MONTEFIORE'S POWERFUL WEAPON IN WAR AGAINST CANCER -- SUPER G COBALT 60 UNIT INSTALLED --

One of the most powerful and versatile weapons in the fight against cancer—the Eldorado Super G. Cobalt 60 Teletherapy unit—has been installed at the Montefiore Hospital. According to Executive Director Sidney M. Bergman, this powerful radiation producing machine is one of only a few of its kind—the fourth produced—in the world.

The Cobalt 60 therapy unit makes possible more effective treatment of tumors, particularly deep-seated lesions, under conditions which insure greater safety for patients. Dr. Stuart J. Weiss, Director of Therapeutic Radiology, believes that more effective therapy can be accomplished with less damage to the skin, and that patients generally will experience lower systemic reaction following treatment with the Super G. According to Radiology Department Chairman, Dr. H. W. Friedman, the new unit provides higher dose rates in shorter treatment periods and increases treatment distances with resulting greater efficiency.

Housed in a specially shielded room on the ground floor of the Main Building, the Cobalt 60 generates about the same amount of radiation as an x-ray machine operating at three million volts. Nearly 17,000 pounds of lead—and 45,000 pounds of other radiation-resistant materials—have been added to the concrete walls of the room to assure complete radiation safety. This is in accordance with specifications by Atomic Energy of Canada Limited, manufacturers of the machine which was purchased for Montefiore through General Electric's X-ray Department, Milwaukee, Wisconsin. The cobalt source was delivered in a two-ton lead container. Two General Electric physicists calibrated the high-power machine to ready it for precision therapy work.

Acquisition of the Super G, which costs more than \$80,000, was made possible with assistance from the Membership Fund of Montefiore Hospital.

The machine's sourcehead is adjustable, permitting it to be beamed at practically any lesion area. This feature is particularly important because of the random shapes of tumors. A heavy alloy of lead and tungsten shields sourcehead radiation.

Overall dimensions of the cobalt unit are 102 inches high, 33 inches wide, and 78 inches long. Total installed weight is 4,200 pounds.

Dr. Y. David Koskoff, Clinical Associate Professor of Neuro-Surgery at the University of Pittsburgh Medical School and Chief of the Division of Neuro-Surgery at Montefiore, was guest speaker during a recent "Teaching Weekend" conducted at Charleston General Hospital.

Subjects discussed were: "Internal Carotid Artery Occlusion" a Case Report; Surgical Aspects of Endarterectomy; "Practical Stereotaxis Instrumentation in Treatment of Parkinsonism"; and "Trauma to the Nervous System; Medical-Legal Considerations".

OPERATION PREP PITT PROCEDURES SUBSTANTIALLY IMPROVED

On Saturday, May 27, Montefiore Hospital was one of the thirteen Pittsburgh district hospitals which participated in Operation Prep Pitt IV, the community-wide disaster exercise co-sponsored by the Allegheny County Medical Society, the Office of Civilian Defense, the Hospital Council of Western Pennsylvania and allied organizations.

Participation in two previous exercises has enabled the Disaster Committee, chaired by Dr. Rosenberg, to make substantial improvement in the overall plan. One evidence of such change this year was the considerable reduction of traffic congestion achieved by routing ambulatory patients directly from the triage area to the Out Patient Department in place of escorting them through the Main Building.


