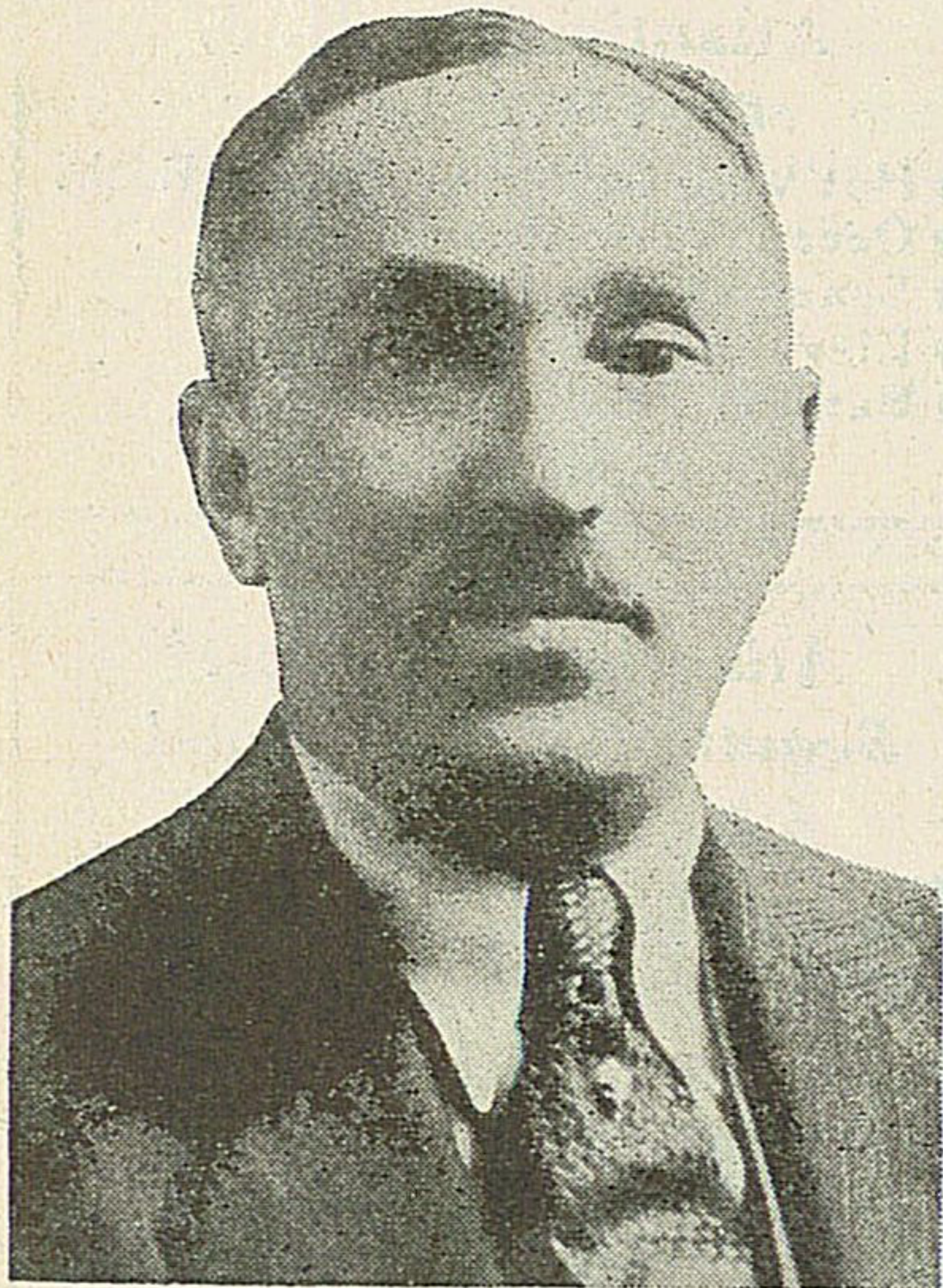


New Restaurant Opening in Squirrel Hill
