

**Congregation Poale Zedeck:**—Daily services begin at 6:45 A. M. and Mincha at sunset. Sabbath services begin Friday evening at sunset; Sabbath morning at 8:30 P. M., Mincha at 4:30 P. M. Before Mincha, at 3:30, P. M. Rabbi Friedman gives a homiletical discussion on the Sedrah of the week. After Mincha the table is set for "Sho'leth Sudoth" in the vestry of the synagogue, and the "Sabbath Zomiroth" are beautifully chanted and is concluded by a Biblical talk on the portion of the week by Rabbi Friedman.

The Sunday Religious School has reopened with a large attendance of pupils that were organized into six classes. Children from the ages of five years to sixteen years, inclusive, are admitted. Children of non-members are also welcome to enroll in both the daily Talmud Torah and Sunday Religious School. The sessions of the daily Talmud Torah commence at 4:00 P. M. of the Sunday Religious School at 10 A. M. At 11:30 A. M. the children of all classes assemble in the synagogue and are addressed by Dr. Friedman.

On Sunday afternoon, November twentieth, Rabbi S. B. Friedman spoke on "Agudath Kehilloth Politics" in the presence of a very large attendance of men and women, representing all the synagogues of the city of Pittsburgh.

Rabbi Friedman explained the reasons that urged him to organize the Agudath Kehilloth on December 27th, 1920; and outlined briefly the aims and purposes for which such an organization should have stood for—but in the closing remarks of his lengthy address stated his reasons for seeing fit at this time to sever all his connections from now on with the Agudath Kehilloth of Pittsburgh.

Rabbi Friedman was followed by other Rabbis and prominent laymen among them Rabbi Friedman of Brun Czecho-Slovakia, Rabbi Winkler of Homestead, Mr. H. Kalson, President of the Agudath Kehilloth and Mr. Max Friedman former chairman of the Vaad Hakashrus.
