Dear Sirs:

Mr. Bernard Mars of 5814 Elmer Street, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania has been under my care since June 10, 1950 continuously to the present for the following reasons: grass and ragweed hay fever which had their onset in 1947, perennial allergic and infected rhinosinusitis, chronic recurrent headaches, and pruritus ani. In addition, there was a history suggestive of clinical drug allergy to aspirin.

A clinical allergy to milk was established as a contributing factor in the production of his headaches. As a result, he has been maintained on a diet excluding milk and milk products.

He has been receiving specific antigenic therapy with the following: ragweed and grass and plantain pollen, house dust extract, and respiratory vaccine. This therapy is administered on a weekly schedule.

Allergen skin test reactions were as follows:

Marked positive reactions were obtained to ragweed, grass, pork, lobster, and horradendron mold.

Positive reactions were obtained to dust, plantain, kapok, tobacco mixture, early and late trees, chocolate, sweet potato, tomato, blackberry, and strawberry.

Doubtful positive reactions were obtained to horse dander, cottonseed, glue, oats, rye, goat's milk, lima bean, spinach, cucumber, clam, cashew nut, flounder, cocconut, walnut, canteloupe, cherry, grape, peanut, plum, and raspberry.
