MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR

The building of a Hillel Foundation resembles the planting of a tree. A seed is planted and soon many deep roots anchor the tree securely in its place and give it strength to serve those who come within its compass.

Hillel's process of taking root in the Pittsburgh community is now five years old. It is doubtful that the original founders could have imagined the multiplicity of influences which their dream was to radiate

in the community.

The most unusual aspect of Pittsburgh Hillel is the variety of its activities. Serving three campuses actively, Hillel has become a major force on each. The Hillel cultural program now serves a goodwill purpose which is entirely unanticipated. About thirty-five percent of the students in attendance at Hillel classes and lectures are non-Jewish. This is goodwill in action. No banquet or pious resolution can possibly compare to the influence for goodwill which Hillel has on these and other students. The Tech Hillel is soon to begin a new experience in cooperation with the other religious foundations. A joint program of non-credit religious courses in Judaism and Christianity will be offered by all major religious groups acting in concert. This program is unique in the United States and if successful, will be a guide to new directions in college religious work.

One of the unseen areas of Hillel activise in the field of personal counselling. Hillel maintains direct and free contact with the University counselling service, so that students who come to Hillel for help and guidance are assured of the most skilled and disciplined help available.

The influence of Hillel in the Pittsburgh community is, of course, a reflection of the influence of B'nai B'rith in the community. Without the continued support of B'nai B'rith, this entire area of Jewish contribution to the life of Pittsburgh would be nonexistent. Furthermore, more important than the fact of support is the kind of support. B'nai B'rith has not only been generous but wise in the way it has structured the Hillel Foundation, so that Hillel can do its work with maximum efficiency and depth.

CAMPUS CAPERS

Campus Capers this year was held on Monday, February 16th in the Y. M. & W. H. A. The skits offered by the student groups were enthusiastically received. The theme for the evening was "World Shaking Events". Chatham College won first prize with its take-off on a Greek tragedy (Dicchotomus Rex). Students in the Chatham Hillel Seminar thought that the opinions expressed by Sig Freudicles, one of the principal characters in the tragedy, sounded strangely like those of Rabbi Rubenstein. Few satires have occasioned as much laughter. Third prize was won by Alpha Epsilon Phi Sorority, which presented a musical spoof on love. Second prize was won by Pi Lambda Phi Fraternity with its debate on whether the Hamantashen or the Latke had contributed most to the development of civilization. Master of Ceremonies of this event was Marty Wolfson, who also presented a "Chalk Talk".

HILLEL COOPERATES IN UNIQUE PROGRAM OF EDUCATION AT TECH

For the first time on any campus the Religious Workers Fellowship of Tech has created a unique program to meet the needs for advance education in religion on campus. The Religious Workers Fellowship has instituted the TECH SEMINARS IN RELIGION. By pooling their combined resources the Fellowship is offering the Tech student body five non-credit courses in religion which are scheduled to last for eight weeks.

Rabbi Rubenstein is offering a course on EXISTENTIALISM. Among the other courses are Bible, Martin Luther, John Calvin, Religious Ethics and St. Augustine's Philosophy.

Serious study and discussion was given to the problem of meeting the educational needs of Tech students in Religion. It was felt that there was a pressing need for courses on Religion on a mature level. Two approaches were possible: The foundations could each go their separate ways with an attendant weak program; or, a joint effort could give material strength to all groups. So far as is known, this effort is unique. Twenty students are registered for Rabbi Rubenstein's first class. The majority are non-Jewish.

Plans are being made to expand this program next year. A similar program is in planning stages at Pitt.

HILLEL CULTURAL PROGRAM

A continuing and growing interest in the cultural aspects of Jewish life has been exhibited in the growth of attendance at Rabbi Rubenstein's lectures and seminars. This semester a new course has been offered at Pitt on Mondays at noon on The Great Books and the Human Condition in our Times. This series relates the student's study of reading and human values to his quest for an adult understanding of his Jewish traditions. On Thursdays at noon. the lecture series on Existentialism and Contemporary Religious Thought has entered its second semester. Chatham has begun a seminar discussion of The Great Books and the Human Condition in our Times. Thursdays at 4:30 P. M. and Tech has begun a discussion of Religious Philosophy in connection with the brunches, which are held every other Sunday in the Carnegie

HILLEL SOCIAL PROGRAM

There has been a steady growth in attendance at Hillel social functions. The Chanukah affair attracted 200 students from Pitt, Tech, Chatham and Duquesne. Vivien Richman, Israel Folk Singer, presented a program of Israeli music. The highlight of the program was the dedication of the Hi Fidelity sound system, given in memory of Mrs. Pearl Reiner by her sister, Mrs. Morris Benkovitz. In keeping with the spirit of Chanukah, latkes were prepared and served by the B'nai B'rith women.

On January 10, 1959, a Hillel social was held featuring Burt Friedman, Folk Singer. Over 100 students attended the Welcome Freshman dance and social held on February 8th and approximately 150 students attended Campus Capers on February 16
