"It's easy to understand why youth are turned off by reform and conservative synagogues because of the way Judaism is diluted ... even in orthodox synagogues a newcomer is not brought into the scope of the service, but when we have youth over for Shabbos dinner we argue logically why we believe the way we do, and are receptive to the kid's challenges," states Rabbi Katzen.

Concluding, Rabbi Katzen remarks, "Anyone with a heart and a brain will react positively to the Lubavitch Youth Organization's programs." (He is very convincing ... if I gave him the chance, he could probably make a Chassidic Jew out of me). Needless to say, I am impressed with the comments and accomplishments of Rabbi Shmerel Katzen. 
