"Pgh. Friends" Debbie offers various programs to Jewish youth. Students are invited weekly, to Chassidic homes for Shabbus, to enjoy the traditional Shabbos meals. (This costs about \$2000 per vear for food and kitchen help.) Biannual Chassidic encounters -weekends of lectures, singing, dancing etc. -- are also held (Annual cost is \$1,000).

Rabbi Katzen explained that the goal of "Pgh. Friends" is to "reach out to university (and high school) students, to get to know them, to make an impression on campuses, to sponsor tefillin campaigns, and to provide Shabbos meals, etc."

"We want to get the Jew back to being a committed Jew ... to finding himself through Torah mitzvot, i.e. traditional Judaism."

He said that many kids get involved in other experiences, instead, relating to drugs, for example. Lubavitch hopes to offer them a better "package".

While other cities have Chabad Houses (Lubavitch Youth Centers), Pgh. does not, presently. However, Shmerel "undoubtedly plans to have one soon." He can be reached by phone at 422-8034.
