Spector Award to Rudolph Shatters Precedent

The United Jewish Federation broke with tradition in announcing Leonard H. Rudolph as winner of the coveted Emanuel Spector Award before the Annual Meeting.

In making the presentation, 1971 Award Winner Alvin Rogal explained, "We knew Leonard Rudolph's friends and family have such affection and pride for him that they would want to know in advance and consent to share the pleasure of this joyous occasion with him."

Rogal said Rudolph "can best be described with four words: family, friends, community and work. His warmth, his easy affection and his kindness are guarantees of a successful family. Leonard has served people -- all kinds of people -- and they like him. He has made extremely significant contributions to our community and consistently over many years right up through the Yom Kippur Campaign when he worked harder and more effectively than at any time in his career.

"Successful communal service is a product of dedication, energy, compassion and understanding. Organizations (Leonard serves)... all bear the imprint of his ideas, his grasp of financial issues, his systematic approach to problem solving -- and they and we are all the better for his participation and effort."

Rudolph's wife, Doris, said she was honored at being given the recognition of achievement and dedication in and to the community for past ef-

orts. However, to me it serves as an inspiration for the future -- for more activity and increased community involvement.

"A past Spector Awardee wrote me a note saying 'Remember the plaque is heavy'... a reminder of the responsibility for continued service to the community. I would like my children and their generation to remember us and our generation as at least trying to set an example of what is right and good and of their obligations to their fellow man... my only wish is that whatever help I gave in the past to merit this award that I shall be fortunate enough to help in the future in great dimensions so that I may continue to be worthy of what the Emanuel Spector Award exemplifies..."

Leonard Rudolph is an immediate past Vice-President of the Federation and has held significant positions of leadership in fund-raising and social planning and budgeting. He has served as an officer and on the Boards of Riverview Apartments, Montefiore Hospital, the Chronicle, and the Brandeis Club of Pittsburgh. He has also been active on the boards of the Y-ICC and State of Israel Bonds. Nationally he has served on the Joint Distribution Committee and the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds Campaign Services Committee.

Rudolph's wife, Doris, also active in Federation activities, was present with their children William and Wendy and members of the family and friends. Son Jimmy, working in Israel, was unable to attend.
