

**Pittsburgh Jewish Seminary "Yeshivah":**—On Sunday, May 8th, 1921, there was the formal opening of the Pittsburgh Jewish Seminary "Yeshivah" at Kneseth Israel Synagogue, 72 Miller Street. Many prominent people were present and also the parents of the scholars of the seminary. Addresses were delivered by Rabbi Elihu W. Kochin, of this city, who talked on the "Purposes of the 'Yeshivah.'" Dr. H. Auslander, formerly of McKeesport, Pa., and now an instructor in the seminary, talked on the "Value of the Study of the Torah and Its Commentaries to the Jewish Youth." Mr. Yo-chelson, a teacher of the seminary, spoke on "The Meaning of Talmud and Its Value to Judaism." The closing address was given by Rabbi Garfinkel on the "Benefits of a Yeshivah to American Jews."

The Pittsburgh Seminary is under the supervision of Rabbi W. Kochin and a board of directors composed of members from the various Pittsburgh Jewish congregations. The aim of the seminary is to give to the Jewish youth a higher education than was heretofore available in Pittsburgh. Instruction will be given in the Bible along with its commentary Rashi and also in Talmud. People interested are invited to come any Sunday morning to the seminary, which is located at 72 Miller Street.
