

### "A BEAUTIFUL ROSE"

A wealthy king had a very large diamond that unfortunately had been damaged; on one of its faces was a one inch scratch. Of course a scratch like this would make this priceless gem worthless if it could not be repaired. The King called all of the jewelers in his kingdom to ask for a volunteer to repair the scratch on the diamond. To the jeweler who could repair the jewel the King offered a \$1 million reward. If the jeweler who volunteered to help was not successful he would have his business confiscated and would be banished from the Kingdom.
