

# Talmudical College Gets Home In Shaare Zedek Building

The announcement of the opening of the new Talmudical College of Pittsburgh "brings a new dimension of Jewish education into the Pittsburgh community," according to its founding committee.

With emphasis on study and research in Talmud the school will operate on a college level and is presently accepting applications from high school graduates or university students.

The Talmudical College is not embarking on a building campaign, but will use existing facilities in the community, through the offer of the Congregation Shaare Zedek (Anshe Poland). The entire building of Congregation Shaare Zedek, situated at the corner of Bartlett St. and Murray Avenue in Sq. Hill has been put at the disposal of the Talmudical College, for classes and dining hall.

Separate arrangements have been made for housing facilities for the young men who will attend the Talmudical College.

In announcing the invitation to the first Yeshiva G'dolah in Pittsburgh, Samuel B. Cohen, president of Shaare Zedek stated that "the membership has authorized me to offer the facilities of our

Congregation, including the study hall, the Beth Hamidrash and dining facilities in our building, for the use of the newly established Talmudical College of Pittsburgh. We are very happy that we are able to participate in this noble enterprise and that our Synagogue, one of the oldest in the Pittsburgh community, will be revitalized by this important and new activity in Jewish education."

Jacob D. Teitelbaum is vice-president, Allan Goppman is secretary, and Samuel N. Goldman is the treasurer of Shaare Zedek. The Congregation was first organized on Scott Street in the old Hill district and subsequently moved to its present location on Bartlett Street more than a decade ago.

In acknowledging and accepting Shaare Zedek's significant invitation, Rabbi Yitzhak Alster, Dean (Rosh Hayeshevah) of the Talmudical College, commended the Congregation for "its responsible action to keep the doors of Shaare Zedek open as a "makom Torah," a site for Jewish study and scholarship, on a serious, adult level. We too, feel a deep sense of responsibility in this connection as we look to the establishment of the Talmudical College as a fruitful contribution to the Pittsburgh Jewish community."
