

Secretary's Report

THE Pittsburgh Milk and Ice Association was founded with the idea of giving a good start in life to the very young among the poor.

Between two and three hundred babies are fed daily with pure, clean milk, thro' the efforts of this Society. Babies and young children under five years of age, who otherwise would be fed on thin, watery, blue milk, are growing strong and fat because they have good food.

Feeding babies on germ-laden milk means a high death rate. Milk is all they have, and if that is poor, the helpless little ones do not have a fair chance to live.

When the Society started work, nine years ago, less than sixty bottles of milk a day were sent out. From April 1st, 1907, to April 1st, 1908, 650 bottles were distributed daily, and the lives of hundreds of babies were undoubtedly saved. During the year ending April 1st, 1908, we distributed 100,571 bottles of modified milk, and 169,058 bottles of pure whole milk.

Report of Medical Director.

During the year ending April 1st, 1908, I have had over 1065 cases. These have received more or less medical aid, and all have been advised as to the care and feeding of infants and young children. Nursing mothers have been shown how to retain their milk and avoid giving the baby the bottle. Several talks on these and kindred subjects have been given to mothers' meetings, clubs and at our milk stations. Our Secretary, Mrs. Wade, and I have exercised a general supervision of all our stations as well as the distribution of the milk.

Our Association will furnish milk, paid for in part, or even gratis, to any patient who brings a written application from his or her physician; any physician in Pittsburgh may take advantage of this if necessary.

We wish to express our appreciation of the co-operation of Dr. J. F. Edwards, Supt. of the Board of Health, and of Dr. Ogden Edwards, Chairman of the Milk Commission of the Allegheny County Medical Association.
